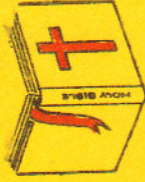

## GENERAL INFORMATION

Founded in 1961, Emmanuel is located at 610 Boscobel Street in East Nashville. Classrooms, Chapel, the Administrative Offices are located in Historic Edgefield. Classroom lectures, visual presentations, textbook instruction, on and off site clinicals and student participation in sermon presentations, regular testing and examinations and written presentations are all incorporated into the courses at Emmanuel.

Emmanuel is faith-based, coeducational, and provides the courses offered, as they relate to Biblical ministries. As an Independent Bible College, we emphasize the authority of the Bible and Christian Holiness, EBC seeks to meet the needs of those feeling God's call to service, through intense Biblical and Ministry related courses of study.

Classes are offered in the evening hours, from 6 until 10p.m. on Monday nights.

**CALENDAR:** There are two semesters, first week of August through first week of December and second week of January through second week of May. Enrollment begins two weeks prior to first classes. Holidays recognized are Labor Day in September, and, Dr. Martin Luther King Day, in January.

### AFFILIATION

Emmanuel Bible College is controlled by an Administrative Board of Directors, duly elected. The Institution is independent, fundamental, and interdenominational. Support of the institution is from tuition and gifts from friends of the College. The administration is made up of men and women who desire to see that all persons have an opportunity to study God's Word.

**ATTENDANCE:** Three absences are permitted, per semester. More than three will result in suspension of class participation, until or unless counselor and instructor approval is granted.

## DOCTRINAL STATEMENT

We Believe:

The Bible. We believe that the Bible, composed of the sixty-six books of the Old and New Testaments, is inspired of God by verbal, plenary inspiration; is inerrant in the original autographs; and is the supreme and final authority in faith, practice, and all other areas to which it speaks.

THE TRINITY. We believe in one God, eternally existing in three persons—the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit - Who created all else from nothing.

THE FATHER. We believe that God the Father, the First Person of the Divine Trinity, is a Spirit - infinite, eternal and unchangeable in all His attributes...

THE SON. We believe that Jesus Christ is God the Son, the Second Person of the Divine Trinity, that He was begotten of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary, that He is true God and true man, and that He is the only and sufficient Mediator between God and man.

THE HOLY SPIRIT. We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, the Third Person of the Divine Trinity, and that He convicts the world of sin, regenerates the sinner, baptizes, indwells, guides, instructs and empowers all believers for godly living and service

MAN. We believe that man was created in the image of God, that he disobeyed and thereby incurred both spiritual and physical death; consequently, all men are sinners by nature and practice and are in need of regeneration without which they are eternally lost.

SALVATION. We believe that the substitutionary death and bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ provides the only ground for justification, that personal faith in Him is the only condition for salvation.

THE CHURCH. We believe that the universal church, founded at Pentecost, consists of all true believers and that local churches are established for the purposes of worship, instruction, mutual edification and world-wide witness.

ESCHATOLOGY. We believe that the resurrected Christ ascended into heaven and now appears before the Father as our Advocate. We look forward to His personal, bodily, visible, premillennial return.

JUDGEMENT. We believe in the bodily resurrections of both the saved and the lost; the saved unto everlasting blessedness in perfect union with Christ and the lost unto everlasting punishment separated from God.

#### **COLLEGE SERVICES**

##### **RELIGIOUS LIFE**

Emmanuel places special emphasis on the development of the religious life. Classes are regularly opened with prayer. There are chapel services. Students are required to attend. All students are expected to attend a local church.

A prayer chapel, for private meditations is provided.

##### **COUNSELING SERVICES**

The college offers a counseling/advising service to its students. Any member of the faculty, administration of staff is willing to be available to a student who desires assistance.

##### **ACADEMIC ADVISING**

Every new freshman will be assigned to a faculty/student advising team for the Fall Semester. These groups meet during the semester to discuss scheduling of time, goal setting, study methods, values and other adjustment problems of new freshmen. Students are assigned to academic advisors according to their choice of field of study. The Academic Dean provides assistance for students in academic difficulties.

## ADMISSION AND RECORDS

### ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Applying for enrollment in the Bible College is a fairly simple procedure.

1. Write to the Admissions Office of the College for an application form. The address is P.O. Box 60508, Nashville, Tennessee 37206.
2. The form should be completed and returned along with:
  - a. A \$25.00 non-refundable admission fee.
  - b. Official certification of High School and College work must be sent to the Office of records.
3. Upon receipt of all information and approval of a student's application, a certificate of acceptance will be mailed to each applicant. Applicants not approved are also notified by letter.

Former students who have not been enrolled in the college the previous semester must apply for re-admission.

### Re-Admission Procedure

Former students need to submit a Re-admission form and should write to the Director of Admissions and advise him of their desire to reactivate their credentials. If they have attended other colleges after leaving Emmanuel, official transcripts from each college attended must be sent to the Office of Admissions prior to registration.

### Notice of Nondiscriminatory Policy as to Students

Emmanuel Bible College admits students of any race, color, national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the College. It does not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, color, handicap, national and ethnic origin in administration of its educational policies, admissions policies and other college-administered programs.

### ACADEMIC STATEMENTS

Courses of studies offered by Emmanuel Bible College are not intended to advance persons in the secular field of employment nor does the degrees offered qualify a holder to teach in state supported school under current law. Studies are to provide one with skills required to carry on the work of Gospel ministry as well as other areas of Christian service. Work offered by Emmanuel will aid the student in preparing to teach in a Christian Day School.

Emmanuel is a church related institution, a chartered non-profit

corporation religious by nature and operates on an excluded status as provided under Tennessee State law. Emmanuel is registered with the Tennessee State Board of Education.

The course of study offered by Emmanuel are of college excellence and provide the student with one of the most comprehensive Bible and ministerial training courses available.

### ACADEMIC POLICIES

**Semester Credit System:** The College operates on the semester system. The unit for counting credit is the semester hour. A semester hour of credit consists of one fifty-minute period of class work per week, with an assumption of two hours of outside preparation, or two sixty-minute periods of laboratory work.

**Grades, Quality Points, and Grade Point Average.** All work is graded by letters which are assigned quality points as interpreted below:

An incomplete grade is given for sickness, emergency reasons, etc. An "I" must be removed within the following semester or it becomes a permanent "F".

**Adding or Dropping Courses:** Up to the dates indicated in the calendar, courses may be dropped according to the following procedures:

1. Obtain forms from the Registrar' office and fill out properly.
2. Secure approval of the advisor and Academic Dean.
3. Return form to the Registrar' office.

If a course is dropped within a prescribed period of time no record is made. Classes dropped after the last scheduled day will incur an NC except in case of withdrawal from school when a W will be assigned.

Exceptions to these rules must be handled by the Academic Dean.



## TRANSFER CREDITS

Students from other institutions seeking admission to advance standings in the College must present an official transcript of all work taken Criteria for accepting credits from other institutions.

1. Courses must have been a "C" or better.
  2. The credits earned must be in subject area compared to those offered by Emmanuel Bible College.
  3. Credits must not be more than 10 years old.
- Substitutes for required courses must meet the approval of the division chairman and the Academic Dean. All transcripts submitted will be evaluated and the prospective student advised of amount of credit given.

## FINANCIAL INFORMATION

### Support

Emmanuel has from the beginning operated on a faith basis. Believing the school was founded under the leadership of God, the Holy Spirit, we believe He will supply the means to carry it on. God has supplied the needs across the quarter of a century.

The College has no established source of income and charges a nominal tuition, therefore we must depend upon the contributions of individuals and churches to continue to operate.

The desire of Emmanuel's administration is to keep the student's expenses at the lowest possible figure. The school is financed by God's people, churches, classes and individuals who have been led by the Holy Spirit to see the need of a Bible training ministry.

A non-refundable application fee of \$25.00 is charged all students applying for the first time.

Each semester a registration fee of \$25.00 is required of all students.

In cases of proper and approved withdrawal from the school, tuition will be refunded as stipulated under "Refund Policy". There will be no refund in cases of termination for non-attendance without formal withdrawal.

For auditing without credit, the enrollment fee is **\$25.00** per semester hour.

There is a graduation fee of **\$125.00** to cover the cost of diplomas and commencement expenses, which must be paid by March 1 of each year. This fee is non-refundable if the student fails to meet the requirements for graduation.

Tuition payments may be set up on a promissory note schedule. In all cases tuition must be paid in full before the semester ends.

## Refund Policy

For students dropping out of school or dropping a course, the following refund policy applies to tuition and fees.

## ASSOCIATE OF ARTS IN BIBLE

### *Associate Religious Arts*

### Purpose

The purpose of the associate of Arts in Bible is to provide a two-year program of study for those who desire to obtain a basic understanding of the bible and related subjects.

This program of study was developed to meet two main educational objectives. One is to train Christians to understand and Biblical approach to life so that they may more effectively serve the Lord in any vocation they choose to enter. This program will enable recent high school graduates the opportunity to receive a year of training in Biblical studies before attending a university or pursuing an occupation. The second objective is to provide God-called servants a basic curriculum of Biblical, professional, and general education courses for their church-related ministries.

### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Numbering of courses - courses are numbered according to the following plan: 100 to 199 are primarily for freshmen; 200 to 299 are primarily for sophomores; 300 to 399 are primarily for juniors; 400 to 499 are primarily for seniors.

#### DEPARTMENT OF BIBLE

Bi 101 Bible Survey, New Testament, Part I. An introduction to the New Testament dealing with the history, writers, geographical aspects, prophetic insights and such. Covers the early books of the New Testament. 4 semester hours

Bi 102 Bible Survey, Part II. A continuation of study from the New Testament Scriptures with the goal of helping the student to understand and use the New Testament in living, teaching and preaching. Prerequisite Bi 101. 4 semester hours

Bi 120 Exploring the Old Testament. An overview of the Old Testament tracing the literature and history of God's people from Genesis to Malachi. 4 semester hours

Bi 123 The Pentateuch, Part I An introductory guide to the study of the first five books of the Old Testament. The sacrificial system, priestly ordination, day of atonement and a holiness manifesto are discussed. Other near eastern literature is cited and summarized where relevant. Such as, law codes of the Second and First Centuries B.C.

Bi 124 The Gospels. An overview of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John in relation to the author, message and the life of Christ. 4 semester hours

Bi 145 The Life of Christ. A study of Christ's virgin birth, miracles, ministry, crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension. 4 semester hours

Bi 220 The Pentateuch, Part II. Overviews of each chapter of the first five books of the Old Testament. Higher critical matters are dealt with, in a succinct matter where they arise, (the unity and internal consistency of the creation and flood narratives). Prerequisite, Bi 123. 4 semester hours

Bi 221 The Minor Prophets. A stirring introduction to the 12 men of God whose outcry against the prevailing sin of idolatry points the way in this day. 4 semester hours

Bi 222 Meet the Major Prophets. This course deals with Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and Daniel. 4 semester hours

Bi 223 The Book of Acts. An expository study of the book of Acts, focusing on the Holy Spirit's ministry in the young Church. 4 semester hours

Bi 224 Life and Teachings of Jesus. A searching study of the Beatitudes and sharing the "beautiful attitude of Jesus." 4 semester hour

Bi 225 The Apostle Paul. The life doctrine and main theme of Paul are studied, thus offering the student an understanding of this man so greatly used of God. 4 semester hours

Bi 226 Know Your New Testament. A brief analysis of each book and the conditions under which it was written. The purpose of this study is to make the New Testament more intelligible and easily taught to others. 4 semester hours

Bi 240 Highlights of the Bible. Genesis-Nehemiah. An overview of the first 17 books of the Bible. This study provides a wealth of history and Biblical illustrations for preaching. 4 semester hours

Bi 250 Expository Studies in I Corinthians. Comprehensive and contemporary expository studies of I Corinthians ministries. 4 semester hours

Bi 301 Introduction to the Bible. Examine ancient writings, archaeological discoveries, and historical facts contributing to this investigation and defense of the Biblical records. 4 semester hours



Bi 310 Tabernacle Types and Teachings. An aid in relating the meaning, furniture, purpose and contrast of the tabernacle of Salvation.  
4 semester hours

Bi 315 The Pauline Epistles. An understanding of the times, conditions, and message of the Apostle Paul's letters.  
4 semester hours

Bi 316 Heart of Hebrews. This course is designed for students who have already studied the Old Testament. Hebrews' heart is "He is here at last".  
4 semester hours

Bi 320 Bible Geography. The Bible lands become alive as the student learns of the land of Jesus Christ and the Disciples. Towns, cities, villages, rivers, campaigns, etc. coordinate the Scripture into proper context.  
4 semester hours

Bi 335 Joshua. A careful study of this leader and how he is a forerunner of Christ. The study makes use of archaeological and linguistic evidence in pursuing theological exegesis. Conservation, evangelical.  
4 semester hours

Bi 345 Romans. An exposition of the book of Romans is conducted allowing the student to not only study about its author and purpose, but to explore the doctrinal truths as found in Romans.  
4 semester hours

Bi 350 The Bible and Judaism. A Study of Jewish religious practices, holy days and doctrines.  
4 semester hours

Bi 401 The Central Message of the New Testament. The study shows the unity of the New Testament.  
4 semester hours

Bi 410 The General Epistles. A study of James, I,II,III John and I, II Peter and Jude. Special attention is given to the theme of each book.  
4 semester hours

Bi 423 Revelation. Study of the book of Revelation involving things to come. Attention is given to the historical and prophetic setting.  
4 semester hours

Bi 425 Apocrypha. Though the 14 books of the Apocrypha are doubtful authenticity, interest in these "hidden writings" continues with rising demand for the Holy Scripture.  
4 semester hours

Bi 440 Isaiah. A practical study of the historical setting, the author, his message and the theme of the book is presented.  
4 semester hours

Bi 450 Jeremiah. A practical study of the historical setting and background of Jeremiah as well as its times and message.  
4 semester hours

Bi 460 Ezekiel. A careful study of the prophet and his prophecy. The course examines the date, authorship and historical setting of Ezekiel.  
4 semester hours

Bi 465 Bible Types. A study of Old Testament types which point to the Lord Jesus Christ as coming Savior. This explains how the New Testament is concealed in the Old Testament.  
4 semester hours

Bi 470 Synoptic Gospel. The life and teachings of Jesus as found in the synoptic Gospels. The religious and historical background, the synoptic problem and a harmony of the Gospels.  
4 semester hours

The department of Christian Education is designed to prepare students for professional ministries in Church-related Christian Education such as associate pastor, director of Christian Education, Youth director, workers in organization for children or youth and camp leadership

## DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

CED 101 INTRODUCTION. Survey of the history, principles, and methods of the educational work of the churches.

2 semester hours

CED 105 ENGLISH. A study of the fundamentals of English composition, grammar, parts of speech, and the actual construction of sentences, paragraphs and compositions.

8 semester hours

CED 110 FUNDAMENTALS OF MUSIC. A basic theory course designed for those with deficiencies in music theory.

4 semester hours

CED 115 HYMNOLOGY. A study of English and American hymns, including biographies of hymn authors and composers, historic influences, and the styles of both early and modern hymn writers.

4 semester hours

CED 120 PERSONAL EVANGELISM. How various types of Christian work relates to evangelism. Emphasis is placed on personal soul winning and its place in the life of Christian workers.

2 semester hours

CED 125 EFFECTIVE BIBLE STUDY. Chosen methods of approach to intelligent and systematic study of the Bible.

2 semester hours

CED 140 FOUNDATION OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION. A survey of the historical, social, philosophical and psychological foundations of Christian Education.

4 semester hours

CED 141 GENERAL PSYCHOLOGY. A general survey of the science of human behavior, designed to acquainting the student with principles of human development, learning and behavior.

4 semester hours

CED 160 AMERICAN HISTORY. This course deals with our history from exploration and settlement to the present. Special attention is given to the Twentieth Century movements in the United State.

4 semester hours

CED 201 SUNDAY SCHOOL. Plans, principles and organization of the Sunday School are explored and answered in this course.

2 semester hours

CED 212 WORLD MISSIONS. The changing scenes of Christian missions affords the foundation of this study. Problems and issues confronting the missionary efforts comprise the core of this course.

2 semester hours

CED 225 CHURCH AGENCIES. Various groups of the church are studied, such as missionary society, youth society, Sunday school, vacation Bible School and Children's Church.

2 semester hours

CED 245 MISSIOLOGY. An evangelistic introduction to missiology. The theology of missions and relevant Scriptural data and its relationship to culture.

2 semester hours

CED 250 TEACHING. Teaching goals and Christian action comprise the basics for this study. The course is designed for teacher training.

4 semester hours

CED 310 DISCIPLESHIP. A study of recruitment and development of making disciples. The principles used by Christ and the disciples are studied.

4 semester hours

CED 325 MINISTRY TO CHILDREN. The development and learning process of the child; needs and interest; organization, administration, methods and materials of the church.

4 semester hours

CED 330 MINISTRY TO YOUTH. The principles and practices of effective ministry to youth 12 to 23 years, with specific focus on the role of the minister of youth.

4 semester hours

CED 350 MINISTER TO ADULTS. A survey of the characteristics, needs and problems and at different levels of adulthood; learning experiences and objectives; enlisting and involving adults in the mission of the church.

2 semester hours

CED 365 MINISTRY TO RETIREES. A study of the process and problems of aging, with emphasis on the church's expanding ministry to retired persons.

4 semester hours

CED 410 CHURCH HISTORY. The church in retrospect is considered from its outreach to modern day movements. Personages, places and events inform the student as to the history of the Christian Church.

4 semester hours

CED 420 LEADERSHIP ADMINISTRATION. A survey of the history, principles, functions of leadership and administration theory for Christian education as a basis for developing a personal philosophy and leading to creative planning and problem solving.

4 semester hour



**GED 430 MULTIPLE STAFF.** The building and maintaining the biblical basis and historical development of multiple staff ministry. 4 semester hours

**GED 465 APOLOGETIC.** A study of the evidence supporting the Christian faith. How to apply these truths to life. 2 semester hours

### DEPARTMENT OF THEOLOGY

**Th 112 EXPLORING EVANGELISM.** An indepth study of the history of Evangelism, from the early beginning in the New Testament to James Arminius, in whom the Wesleyan revival took root. 4 semester hours

**TH 120 INTRODUCTION TO CHRISTIAN THEOLOGY.** This study is a study to acquaint the student with the firm foundation on which the structure of Christian doctrine securely rests. A systematic study of the great realities of the Christian faith. 4 semester hours

**TH 122 CHRISTIAN ETHICS.** An evangelistic approach. An introduction to Christian ethics that supply a method of analyzing difficult ethical issues and resolving them in the light of Scripture. 4 semester hours

**TH 125 JOHN WESLEY THEOLOGY.** An introduction to the theology of John Wesley 2 semester hours

**TH 140 A THEOLOGY OF LOVE.** Love is the dynamic and "heart of Wesleyanism" in this in-depth study that probes the very foundations of Wesleyan faith. 4 semester hours

**TH 201-202 CHRISTIAN THEOLOGY I, II, and III** Delves into the province of theology, its ideas and relations, sources, systems and methods, Christian revelation and inspiration of the Scriptures. 4 semester hours

**TH 205 INTRODUCTION TO MINISTRY.** An introductory course dealing with the call to preach, qualification, opportunities for the ministry, and preparation necessary for constructive work in the local church. 2 semester hours

**TH 210 HOMILETICS.** An introduction to the science of preaching, sermon preparation, homiletical construction. 4 semester hours

**TH 214 THE REFORMATION.** A history of Europe in the Sixteenth Century, emphasizing the causes and results of the Reformation with particular attention to the main personalities of this period. 4 semester hours

**TH 225 BIBLE DOCTRINE.** This is a study of the Triune God and Biblical beliefs. The study includes God, Christ, the Holy Spirit, Church, Angels, faith and last things. 4 semester hours

**TH 301 HOMILETICS.** A study of the definition, purpose, and construction of sermons, with special attention given to Scriptural sermon structure. 4 semester hours

**TH 305 ESCHATOLOGY.** Seven major eschatological events are examined. Some of these are: the Rapture, the Great Tribulation, the Anti-Christ and the Millennium. 4 semester hours

**TH 325 RELIGIOUS STUDIES.** Studies of history and discipline of particular church denominations. This course will aid students to meet a particular denomination history course. 4 semester hours

**TH 330 PASTORAL COUNSELING.** Training in principles and techniques of counseling for the pastoral ministry. 4 semester hours

**TH 350 COUNSELING.** Theories and techniques of individual and group counseling are studied. Such topics as the initial interview, the use of background material, and the counselor as a person will be studied.  
4 semester hours

**TH 401 THEOLOGY OF HOLINESS.** The Biblical basis of the doctrine of Holiness with special attention given to the Wesleyan understanding of Christian perfection.  
4 semester hours

**TH 415. WORSHIP.** An attempt to look at worship from the free church and traditional church services. Special attention is given to rediscovering the importance of worship.  
2 semester hours

**TH 425 SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY.** A STUDY OF Christian faith as expressed in the leading theological doctrines, including as attempt to show their cultural and social relevance.  
4 semester hours

**TH 450 LANGUAGES 3.** The basic elements of New Testament Greek with special emphasis on pronunciation, form, vocabulary and syntax, accompanied by sight translation in the Gospel and Epistle conversational Spanish.  
8 semester hours
